A Covenant Legacy

I've come face to face with a brutal reality: despite my best efforts, I'm becoming old – I'm almost 31. I know that many of you just rolled your eyes. I know, I know, 31? Old? He's nuts...Case in point: when I'm talking with our youth, I have to remember that they weren't alive to experience the foundational moments of my life – the enculturation of the internet, Y2K, or September 11th. I was their age when these things happened – and to them, this makes me an old person. To you a foundational moment might look different – maybe it's thoughts of VJ day, the Cuban Missile Crisis, the Kennedy Assassination, Watergate, or the Challenger Disaster – all moments of great historic importance – all moments which happened before I was born. I learned about them through a book, from a story from my parents or grandparents, or (unique to my generation) the internet. All of those memories, experiences and lessons have been handed down to me. That is the way it always has been, and remains to be today – it's an essential part of the human experience. We call this idea **legacy**.

As I reflect on our Number's series and God's covenant people, it's a little crazy to think that the vast majority of the people who are entering into Canaan weren't even born to see the plagues, or the Red Sea crossing, or the handing down of the 10 commandments. And despite not witnessing these foundational moments, these are the people God chooses to enter into the Holy land. So how did they know about the covenant promise? It was handed down to them from their parents and grandparents. A Covenant Legacy.

We often like to think of the people of Israel as this great homogeneous blob, but that was never the way we were meant to regard them. They were tribes, families, parents, and children. Although they were from a different time and place, they operated much the same as our families do today: they had inside jokes, gave nicknames, taught their kids skills, passed down recipes from Grandma, and heard bed-time stories by Grandpa. They were a people of legacy. And the most important legacy handed down to them was the covenant promise of God. After 40 years, they knew the mighty works of YHWH; they knew what He had done for their ancestors and what He had promised to do for them, all because they heard it from old people like you and me.

As we grow *older* one of the most important tasks we have in our life, one vocation which we all share, is to pass forward the knowledge that we've learned to someone else. By *older* I don't mean retirement age, I mean you, person with car keys in their pocket. There is someone in this world that wasn't alive to experience something you did. This calling to share our legacy is powerful, although it's often-overlooked. Sharing what is important about your life, explaining the things that have great value, teaching others the things that you have learned is what legacy is all about. Although I'm young (relatively speaking) I've made it a goal in my life, and in my ministry to share my legacy of faith in Jesus, which was passed down to me, with those who are learning it the first time. I hope that you see that calling as your own as well.

The celebration of the 50th Anniversary may make it easy to look back on the past and the legacy that was made here in Woodbury, Minnesota – a legacy worth celebrating. But I think even more important than past reflections are looking to what our legacy for the future will be. We are immensely blessed at WLC to have kids...everywhere. These kids are excited to hear about the love of Jesus from you. From Nursery to 12th grade, these young people are stepping into the world of faith with fresh eyes and God has uniquely positioned you and me to share the things that we care about in life with them. And while I'm sure they would love to learn all about how to catch a Walleye or how to cook one; I know that they are eager to hear about how Jesus has shown God's Covenant love with you, and just why exactly that is so important to you.

- Intentional I am choosing an amount and giving at least once a month.
- **Priority** I am putting God first, choosing to give generously and in a way that impacts my lifestyle.
- **Fearless** I am depending on God's provision, asking not "how much should I give?" but "how little should I keep?"
- Legacy I am impacting the future of God's Kingdom, giving to outlast my life.

Will you join me in taking some time to pray about where you are at on the journey and where God is leading you next on this journey? After all, no one has ever become poor by giving, but I know many who have been blessed by learning to give and to give generously.

The Fireside Room A Dream for the Future

On a dark and stormy evening, four men drove to a house on a hill outside of Newport. Their mission was to confront a man about what was needed to complete the new church addition that was in the planning stages. The group had spent the afternoon in the District Office concerning funding for the project. Among other things, money for a fireplace in the Fireside Room was denied. It was just to be a conference and meeting room. Undeterred, Pastor Paul Pfotenhauer would not take no for an answer. He persuaded the other three men to accompany him to this hilltop meeting.

The discussion lasted for a while until he looked the man in the eye and stated, "You have been chosen to build a fireplace in the fireside room. It must be stone just like the one you have built here in your home. But it should hold a four foot log. And by the way,

we have no funds to build it. You need to get the rocks for it and it needs to be completed within 90 days."

Ingvalson placed all of the mortar for the entire fireplace. Norm Alrick, Vern Elverson, Scott Stevens, Scott Gilles, Dick Kveton, Ray Merle, Roy Kyndburg and others assisted me, Jack Lavers, in the build. Fran Oehlke provided the truck that we used to pick up the rocks from Wisconsin.

We put the rocks into the form before placing them into the wall of the fireplace. Members were invited to choose and place a family rock into the fireplace. It was completed on time, despite the fact that all of these men had full time jobs at the time.

Although it has gone through many changes over the years, the "Fireside Room" will continue to provide a cozy and comfortable setting for classes, groups and meetings.

P.S. If you have a "family rock" in the fireplace, but aren't sure which one it is, I'm sure Jack would be happy to help you find it.

- We continue to celebrate what God is doing at the Liberty Ridge Campus and we pray that He would bless us to be a blessing to the many people that live near the campus.






OAK HILL UPDATES



An Update On the West End Construction

As you can see, construction on the west end steps has begun. We are removing and replacing the old steps. They had settled nearly 8 inches and fallen away from the building. As a result they were becoming a hazard to people using them and were unsightly.

The new steps are being built on footings which will make them last a lot longer, there will be more greenery and landscaping (less concrete) and there will be a drop off lane which should improve traffic flow. The plan is for it to be done around the end of July.

At that time we will remove and replace the parking lot. This project will be similar to what we did on our other lot a few years ago. The start date will be in August and the timeline is dependent on a number of factors.

Financially we are having a good year. As of the end of May contributions are slightly ahead of budget and expenses are a bit below budget. I thank you for your interest and for you financial support.

"So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life—your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering."

ROAD WORSHIP

If your life is the slightest bit like mine, you spend a good amount of time driving from place to place on a daily basis. We drive kids to school and sports; we drive to work, church, stores, and events. If I am honest, I spend more time driving than I do spending time alone with God at home. And for whatever reason (maybe because we live such hurried lives), the task of driving and sharing the road with other drivers has the potential to turn the gentlest, kindest Christian into the angriest, most frustrated heathen. Ashamedly, I am someone who has spent sweet time in worship only to find myself, moments later, driving impatiently and judgmentally, with a strong sense of road entitlement. We worship and draw near to God in our churches and in our homes; but what if we turned our actual modes of transportation, our course correcting me and has been showing me that even my car should be an intentional place of worship.

I like how The Message paraphrase of Romans 12:1 puts it—that even our "going-to-work," our traveling, should be an act of worship, an offering to God. The Israelites traveled with their worship center, the tabernacle, and Moses encouraged the Israelites to continually engage in worshipful family talk as they traveled. They were instructed to talk to each other about God's goodness wherever they would go and as they were going.

"Teach them to your children. Talk about them when you are at home and when you are on the road, when you are going to bed and when you are getting up. Write them on the doorposts of your houses and on your dashboards and on your steering wheels ..." (Deuteronomy 11:19-20, my paraphrase).

What if every time we got into our mobile worship centers, our vehicles, we drove as if it were our

ministry? It has not been easy, but I have been attempting this. Often I drive alone and will drive in silence as I listen to God, but some of my best times of driving (now ministering and worshipping) have been with my family. As the worship leader and pastor of my mobile ministry (haha), I encourage my full-capacity congregation of five to intentionally look for people to pray for. We worship the Lord with singing, and we take advantage of our close proximity to each other and engage in meaningful conversation. I also teach them about God while we drive.

Rather than being a typical defensive driver, I aim to be a humble road servant who is willing to sacrifice for others, yield, brake, slow down, kindly let people change lanes in front of me, gladly give up my parking space, or even pull over and stop to help someone. I seek to drive with a greater purpose than simply traveling from place to place as quickly as possible. I look for opportunities to minister the love of Jesus to others on the road, and I teach my children to do the same. By ministering like Jesus, even by the way we drive in and out of ourneighborhoods; we allow for the opportunity to share the gospel with others. I'm trying hard to travel in such a way that if I were to park next to someone who had been watching me drive, that person would want to listen to what I have to say.

As we seek to live Spirit-filled lives, we must be willing to ask ourselves if we drive with the fruit of the Spirit engaged. Do I drive with love? Do I drive with joy? Do I drive with peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control? As challenging as it is, let's live lives of sacrificial worship even while driving and allow our Navigator, our GPS, the Holy Spirit, to correct our course when we steer off in the wrong spiritual direction.

Growth & Change What If We Could See...

Problems are part of life! We all have them! How we approach them defines us. Some people, when faced with an obstacle or crisis in their lives, stop right there. They obsess about it – all they want is to rid themselves of it. They turn inward and become quite myopic which prevents change of any kind from happening.

At Celebrate Recovery we strive to actually find something useful in our problem. Doing that requires an act of grace from God, because our natural tendency is to simply deal with the problem and move on. But the way out of our problem shouldn't be our first concern because God sees our difficulties very differently. In a very real sense, they are his "gifts to us", for they bring us to Him and His ways. He has many lessons and a new life for us as we learn to go through our problems.

The word THROUGH is important here. God is not as concerned with getting us out of problems as He is in growing us THROUGH THEM. - We first need to look upward!!

A problem that you cannot solve is, by definition, beyond you. If you could have fixed it, you probably would have. So – whatever your struggle, all of your own attempts to resolve it, are not enough. Problems bring us to the end of ourselves and that's the place where God truly is – He will meet you there!

With the community of Celebrate Recovery and the vehicles available to us here, which are the worship, the teaching, the small group and step study, combined with embracing the 12 Steps and 8 Principles, God then takes us through a journey into ourselves to help us understand what's going on inside us in terms of our attitudes and reactions. When we ask Him to show us the inner workings of our own hearts, it's like shining a spotlight into the recesses

of our hearts – illuminating the hurts, wounds, weaknesses and opinions that need His touch and our submission to Him!

When we look inward, it is then that God reveals that we have certain central issues that are like attitudinal foundation stones. They form reactions that occur in not just one but many areas of life.

Through the tools we have available here, God DOES help us identify themes or patterns in our lives. And as we ask Him to show us TRUTH, we are molded and shaped by that truth into what He wants us to be.

We cannot control all that happens to us, but we CAN control how we respond to what happens around us. It has been said that our choices determine our circumstances and our decisions determine our destiny.
